

National Tree Week 2023



2023 marks the 50th year of National Tree Week, an event that celebrates all things 'tree-related' Since the start of the planting season volunteers have been pulling on their boots to help plant trees and hedgerows across the borough. These will provide connectivity and increase habitats for wildlife, as well many other benefits for our climate, as they help capture carbon and reduce pollution levels.

Lloyds Banking Group took part in the first event at Robin Hood Cemetery by planting 1,000 trees to create two new hedgerows that will connect people and nature. The new hedging will provide a barrier along the road benefiting families visiting loved ones. The volunteers planted a mixture of Cooper Beech, Purple Beech, and Hornbeam, which will provide food, cover and shelter for a variety of birds and wildlife.

Annabel Dolphin, Strategic Lead at Robin Hood Cemetery, said:

"It is our hope that the installation of these hedge whips will allow improved water runoff and provide privacy for those families and friends with a burial taking place adjacent to the road."

Lloyds Banking Group came back for a second event this time at Dorridge Cricket Club, to plant 700 trees on the club's new ground. Leader of Solihull Council, Councillor Ian Courts, along with John Wright, Fiona Mullins and Phil Smith from the club, joined forces with the twenty-five strong volunteers to plant a mixture of mature and young trees, which included a small woodland in the corner of the grounds.

Planting our Future continued to mark National Tree Week with a wide variety of projects. Including planting a weeping willow tree at Nethercote Gardens for the winning resident of the 'Win A Gift That Keeps On Growing' competition, cherry trees with the Friends of Shirley Park at Shirley Park and celebration trees that residents have sponsored in Hope Coppice.

Once again we will be highlighting our tree planting initiative aimed at businesses, colleges, schools and landowners with at least half an acre of land available to plant trees or hedgerows.

The land could be the corner of a field or parkland, part of field boundary or a hedgerow, it doesn't matter. With half an acre being suitable to support up to 500 trees, it makes a significant contribution to reducing CO2 levels in the borough.

The team is always looking to partner with new landowners to create areas for tree planting, hedgerow and green corridors.
