Litter Picking Hubs open at Solihull libraries

Just a reminder that litter picking hubs are now open at libraries across the borough. The hubs act as distributors of Love Solihull litter picking equipment to new volunteers, as well as supporting existing litter pickers with additional rolls of bags.

All new volunteers are invited to <u>register online</u>, after which you will be contacted by a member of the Love Solihull team to confirm when you can collect your kit from a library near you.



Since the hubs re-opened on 1 November, we have signed up a further 50 volunteers, taking our total to just under 700 litter pickers across the borough!

As work progresses at Hope Coppice, the <u>Planting Our Future</u> team was joined by several volunteers from <u>Solihull Faiths Forum</u>, during Inter-Faith Week.

The group assisted in planting native bulbs, sowing wildflower seeds and adding ferns to the natural stumpery, which will become a wildlife haven for insects and even small mammals such as hedgehogs.

Pat, Chair of Solihull Faiths Forum, said: "16 people from different faith communities came along on a beautiful November morning to dig holes and plant snowdrops and daffodils, assisted also by two members of Healthwatch. Everyone enjoyed the chance to make a difference to the environment, share stories, forge new friendships, and contribute to a project that will enable people to reflect on those they have lost through the pandemic and foster hope for the future."

The project, designed by <u>Red Kite Network</u> and delivered by <u>Copper Beech Play</u>, is almost nearing Phase 1 completion, with Phase 2 due to start in the New Year.

Thank you to all the volunteers for contributing to this amazing space which we look forward to bringing to the residents of Solihull.

Repair Cafés are places where people gather to work on fixing everyday objects together, such as electrical and mechanical devices, computers, and other items which can be saved from landfill with a bit of TLC!

Visitors to the Café bring their broken items from home and work with specialists to inject new life or help others with their own projects. It's an ongoing learning process for those involved and gives you the chance to meet new people and enjoy a cuppa too!

This community-led initiative is coming soon to Solihull Zero Wasters, based on Hobs Moat Road.


Volunteers are needed to get the Café up and running - so if you consider yourself to be handy and would enjoy sharing these skills, it could be the right volunteer opportunity for you.
