The planting season began in November, and since then, we've been actively expanding our urban tree coverage throughout the borough. Our efforts have been particularly concentrated in wards with lower canopy tree cover, aiming to enhance green spaces and promote a healthier environment for all residents.



At Planting our Future, we actively collaborate with schools to raise awareness about the numerous benefits of planting trees and hedgerows. By engaging with schools, we aim to foster an understanding of how these green spaces contribute to our overall happiness and health. Trees and hedgerows offer a myriad of advantages, including enhancing wellbeing, bolstering biodiversity, cooling the air, and absorbing harmful air pollutants.

This season, we've had the privilege of collaborating with six schools to plant over 3,000 trees, enriching their environments and promoting healthier surroundings. Pupils from Tudor Grange Academy enthusiastically planted 500 whips, while Langley Primary students cultivated a vibrant fruit orchard. At Windy Arbor, the Eco Warriors dedicated an hour to crafting their own hedgerow. Notably, during the latest tree planting event at Sharmans Cross School, every child in the school participated in planting their own hedgerow, further emphasising our collective commitment to a greener future.







Community Planting Events

There has been no let-up in the steady stream of rain so far this year, making for a very wet and muddy planting season, but it hasn't stopped our volunteers from turning up in their waterproofs and wellies to get stuck in.

Saint Columban's

In early February, a remarkable assembly of over 100 individuals, including 45 students and their mentors from 21 different schools, Columban missionaries,



staff and their families, parishioners from Olton Friary parish, refugees from the Hope Garden project, and employees from MACE, gathered at St. Columban's. Over the course of four days, this diverse group united to plant over 2000 trees in the historic grounds of St. Columban's, formerly owned by the Birds Custard family. It was a heartening display of community collaboration and environmental stewardship.

Dorridge Cricket Club

In February, on a day that was slightly less drizzly, a dedicated team of 15 volunteers from E.ON diligently planted a total of 800 young saplings to establish a hedgerow around their new cricket pitch. DCC (Dorridge Cricket Club) has recently secured funding from Sports England to develop a second pitch on their site, and the newly planted hedgerow will serve as a valuable natural asset. It will offer numerous benefits, including wind breaks, shelters, fence lines, wildlife havens, and noise barriers.

Barston Lane

Volunteers have recently planted 100 trees on a picturesque piece of land adjacent to the canal in Barston. A team of approximately 30 individuals from Lloyds Banking Group enthusiastically joined the effort earlier in March, contributing to the planting of native trees on the site. This new woodland serves as a vibrant green corridor, connecting habitats and fostering a thriving environment for local wildlife.
