Volunteers support biodiversity in local woodland



Our contractor Veolia, and their partners idverde, recently teamed up with local volunteers to tackle overgrown woodland located off Shelly Lane in Monkspath.

The coppicing work formed part of a phased project to address issues such as fly-tipping and overgrown vegetation in the woodland.

Phase one got off to a fantastic start, with *i*dverde providing a dedicated team to fell the dead and dangerous trees, leaving the area safe for volunteers to work in.

With loppers at the ready, volunteers supported by Council staff and contractors, set to work clearing holly from the pathways. The team worked tirelessly, pushing back the vegetation to where it had originally been, leaving the pathway clear and opening up lines of sight to enhance safety in the area and reduce fly-tipping.

Nothing went to waste on the day, with the majority of cuttings and branches used to create 'dead hedges' along the pathway. This feature will both preserve and encourage biodiversity in the area, offering a nice warm home for some of the local wildlife during winter.

The project is still very much in its early stages, but after a hard day's work, we saw some amazing results. A nearby resident even shared some photos dating back to the 1980s which

showed how the woodland looked back then and provided a great comparison for the work carried out.

Residents and locals were left in a state of nostalgia as they looked at the restored woodland and they are now hopeful that with the thinned canopy and the ground clear, bluebells which once flourished in the woodland, will begin to grow again.

Castle Bromwich Litter Pickers have had a very busy year during 2022, collecting approximately 2,500 bags of rubbish.

With around 21 active volunteers, they collect an average of 50 bags every week, in all weather! Since forming, they have removed more than 7,800 bags of litter from Castle Bromwich streets and green spaces.

Their contribution to the local community is hugely appreciated by all at Love Solihull, and we wanted to extend a big thank you to lan Whittle (group leader) for organising the weekly bag collections and coordinating routes with volunteers.

Hockley Heath gathers for annual litter pick



Hockley Heath Parish Council hosted a community litter pick in December, with volunteers meeting at the village recreation ground, before heading off in different directions to collect litter from nearby streets and report any fly-tipping to the council.

Love Solihull supported the event by providing equipment and joining in with picking around the park. Each volunteer collected

at least one bag of a litter, leaving 13 bags ready for collection by the council's waste contractor, Veolia.

The Parish Council has been very active in supporting litter picking over the last few years and usually arrange a group litter pick twice a year which ends with refreshments at the Wharf Tavern.

Take part in tree planting at Elmdon Park



10am - 12 noon, Saturday 14 January 2023.

Meet 10am in the car park by Elmdon Church.

Starting with a short walk, our contractor idverde will identify some of the trees they have already planted. This will be followed by guidance on how to plant the new trees (2-3 foot tall).

Spades and gloves will be provided, but in case of a shortage, please feel free to bring your own. Also, please be prepared for wet and cold weather! (If the weather is extreme we will cancel.)

After this event, over 4,000 similar sized trees will be planted at various plots across the south area of the park. 100 larger trees will be planted at a later date by another team.
